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
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# A Founding Member's Message Mr. Narayan Ramtahal

## EVOLUTION OF THE VOLUNTEER OFFICE

Almost nine years ago, PMISCC expanded outreach to include management awareness training schools, NGOs, CBOs, and other entities. Our goal was to share principles, tools, and hands-on support to foster critical thinking and solutions-oriented actions toward national development, leading to establishment of a dedicated Volunteer Office that manages our biannual Volunteer Outreach Programme.

What started with the core initiative, "Developing a Framework for Project Management at the Trinidad and Tobago Olympic Committee (TTOC)," has grown remarkably. Today, we lead our flagship initiative, the "Schools Outreach Project," while also collaborating with the Cropper Foundation and Girl the Guides Association of Trinidad and Tobago, all with a shared mission of fostering project management awareness and advancing community development. Volunteerism is at the heart of PMISCC's initiatives, and the dedication of our volunteers has been instrumental in building stronger organizations. The early contributions of our volunteers helped shape our outreach vision, design effective programs, and deliver impactful training.

As members of the Volunteer Office progressed to be on the Board of Directors, we recognized the need to

expand our operations, resulting in the establishment of specialized teams, including an events team and a volunteer performance management team. This expansion has allowed us to impact over 1475 youths, enriching their development and engagement.

Our approach has continually evolved, especially during challenges like COVID-19, when we adapted to eplatforms to ensure continuity. Our internal discussions, vibrant and diverse, were always guided by strategic intent and collective commitment, enriching both our programs and the learning experiences of our team.

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to everyone involved in the Volunteer Outreach Programme, which remains crucial in promoting project management awareness and contributing to national development. Together, we can build a better future through the power of volunteerism.

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## Reflections on the PMISCC Chapter Election 2024 Process: Building on Successes and Insights

The 2024 PMISCC Chapter election was a significant event that provided valuable insights for future improvements. Our objectives were to conduct an efficient election, encourage active member participation, and adhere to our timeline. The Nominations and Elections Committee, comprising dedicated members, played a crucial role in navigating the complex process with adaptability and teamwork.

One early challenge was finalizing the Nomination Committee within our planned timeframe. Despite scheduling conflicts, our team's commitment to collaboration enabled us to maintain election momentum.

To engage members effectively, we utilized email as our primary communication tool, reaching out seven times throughout the election. While this approach yielded a voter turnout of 14%, we recognized the need to expand our outreach to platforms like LinkedIn and WhatsApp to enhance participation in future elections.

Additionally, we learned the importance of timely scheduling and resource readiness. Short delays in the nomination phase emphasized the need for streamlined planning, while our decision to launch voting on weekdays rather than weekends aimed to maximize accessibility.

This election demonstrated our team's resilience and commitment to the PMISCC community. The proactive insights gained will serve as a solid foundation for upcoming elections, and we appreciate the hard work and support from all involved.
